Rabbi's Message

For many years, Carrie Cooker has taught our kindergartners and first graders and excited them about Judaism. Carrie's class provides a foundation for Jewish identity that is then built upon in the other grades. At one of our Shabbat services each year, Carrie's young students share their learning and present their journals (which include Hebrew words, themes they are discussing and illustrations), and they sing. For one particular song, "This Pretty Planet" by Tom Chapin, the students not only sing but also sign the words in American Sign Language.

This year had added weight for me as my daughter, who just completed her first year at Miami University, was sitting in the sanctuary signing the song along with the children. She still remembered the words and signs that she learned from Carrie 16 years ago. Seeing this reminded me of how Beth Adam's Religious School plays

a pivotal role in helping give our children a positive and healthy Jewish identity.

Participating in this service and then the final day of Religious School just two days later added special weight to my thoughts about Beth Adam's Religious School. At the closing program, we recognize and thank our extraordinary teachers (all of whom are volunteers). The classes give a short review of what they've learned during the year and announcements are made as to where tzedakah raised will be donated. Of course there is singing and celebration—an air of festivity as there is a sense of accomplishment for a year well done.

Each year we now also recognize students who are graduating from the 12th grade and have continued to participate in our post Bar/Bat Mitzvah Program. Some of these students joined our Religious School in preschool, while others began in later grades. It was moving to see

two young men standing before the assembly—both of whom celebrated their Bar Mitzvah ceremonies in Beth Adam’s sanctuary. It once more helped me to remember and appreciate the responsibility and opportunity we have at Beth Adam to help shape, inspire and pass on a vital and vibrant Jewish identity.

The graduate who had started at Beth Adam in pre-K and now stood before the community as a young man is my son Simi. Once the shortest among his peers, Simi is now taller than I am. On this occasion he stood once more in the front of the sanctuary, but this time not in his Bar Mitzvah suit (which would be way too small), but in the shorts and t-shirt of a High School student. I have no doubt that he will draw on much of his Beth Adam experience as he ventures into the future.

Beth Adam’s Religious School program is an essential part of the congregation. It is one of the areas where we take responsibility as an institution committed to the future of the Jewish people. Whether we have children or not, as a community we recognize our collective responsibility to educate future generations about what it means to be Jewish and help them to develop a wholesome and accurate Jewish identity. Our program is designed to invigorate their spirits and inspire them to see themselves as part of the ongoing evolution of the Jewish people. We want our students to know that they have the right and

responsibility to continue shaping and adding new voices to the Jewish experience.

Since the inception of Beth Adam in 1980, we have been committed to giving a voice to a contemporary Judaism that empowers people. More than just an educational program, with Religious School—coupled with the experiences students have at home—we seek to create a positive Jewish identity. If you know others who may be looking for a similar experience for their children, ask them to contact Rabbi Baum in order to learn more about our program or invite them on the first day of Religious School.

It occurs to me that while we call our Sunday morning children’s education program a Religious School, it is really much more than that. It builds Jewish identity and provides students with the opportunity to understand their role in the Jewish experience.

Community Connection

Rabbi Baum has been selected as a Rabbinic Fellow of Rabbis Without Borders. Rabbis Without Borders is an initiative of CLAL: The National Center for Learning and Leadership. The mission of Rabbis Without Borders is to nurture and develop a network of rabbis who have a common vision: to make Jewish wisdom an accessible resource in helping people across religious and cultural borders enrich their lives.

The Fellowship Program will bring together 20 rabbis from across the country and ideological spectrum to study with leading thinkers, authors, and influential people in the fields of media, politics, public policy, American religion and contemporary spirituality.

Social Action

Social Action is one of our core values at Beth Adam, and part of my role as Executive Director is to work with members to enhance and expand what we are already doing.

In preparation for writing this article I had an “aha” moment when I realized Beth Adam does a lot of Community Service! Furthermore, I’m willing to bet that our members would love to know of all the opportunities as we begin our new year. This past spring Beth Adam members provided a dinner, supervised evening activities and were overnight hosts at the First Unitarian Church for the Interfaith Hospitality Network. This program helps homeless families achieve sustainability and independence. Here are some of the programs and events we have planned so far for the upcoming year.

On Saturday, August 21st Beth Adam members can volunteer through the Loveland Inter Faith Effort (L.I.F.E.) at their BACK TO SCHOOL PROGRAM. This program provides basic school supplies for Loveland families in need, and access to information and resources they may not know about. Please call the office if you're interested in volunteering.

In September our Teens will once again organize our High Holiday food drive for the Loveland Inter Faith Effort (L.I.F.E.). For more information about this program, see the High Holiday section of this Newsletter.

On November 21st we will have our annual Mitzvah Mall. Last year we worked to educate our participants about giving and learned about the eleven worthy community organizations that benefitted from the event.

On December 5th Beth Adam members will provide and serve a nourishing meal for the Over the Rhine soup kitchen. Please contact Charles Margolis at (513) 985-0400 or at admin@bethadam.org to volunteer.

Also on December 5th, Beth Adam's 4th and 5th grade Religious School students will be at Amber Park Retirement Community to present a Hanukkah program.

Our Teens are scheduled to join the Walk to Defeat ALS this Fall—a fundraising event working to end ALS or “Lou Gehrig’s disease.” The Teens are also returning to the Ronald McDonald House to help cook and serve breakfast. Additionally, the Religious School students work throughout the school year to learn about and donate money to charities as a way of learning Tzedakah.

I’m looking forward to working with those members who are interested

in discovering what else Beth Adam can do. We are currently exploring volunteer opportunities for community service on Martin Luther King Day. If you or anyone you know would like to volunteer for a program, or is interested in how they can help, we welcome you to attend one of our Social Action Team meetings. Our next scheduled meeting is October 4th at 6:00pm. See you there!

Israeli Scouts

Our family has been involved with the Netanya scouts to varying degrees for years. This year we took the plunge and got much more involved, becoming a host family for two of the scouts.

For those of you who have not heard of the program, let us give you an overview. Cincinnati has a sister city in Israel, called Netanya. This is a small city north of Haifa, on the Israeli coast. For the past eight years they have been sending a delegation of scouts, both boys and girls, to Camp Friedlander for a two-week stay. Beth Adam has always been the host congregation for this program. This provides a great opportunity for the scouts to come and see a small piece of the United States, and a unique opportunity for nearly a thousand local boy scouts to meet them. The exchange of culture is amazing.

As a host family this year we entertained two 14-year-old boys for a day before they went to camp, and then for another several days once their camp experience was over. We were able to take a behind-the-scenes tour of the museum center, complete with an Omnimax showing. We also all participated in a now “sacred” tradition of ice skating at Northland! We enjoyed a pool party at the Heimans, an amazing barbeque at the Linds and we did a lot of shopping. They also spent an entire day at Kings Island before attending a farewell program at Beth Adam.

The bonds we have forged will undoubtedly last a lifetime. We grew close not just to the boys who stayed with us, but also to the entire delegation of 4 boys, 4 girls, and their leader. It was a fun and enriching experience for everyone, and one that we expect to look back on fondly for years to come.

****For Young Members**

Children and their families are encouraged to attend our High Holiday Services for All Ages, which meet on September 9 at 2:30 PM and September 18 at 2:30 PM. These services are geared for 5-11 year olds, but children of all ages are welcome.

Young adults ages 11 and above are encouraged to attend our adult services. During the daytime Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services, either Rabbi Baum or Rabbi Barr will take the 11 to 16 year olds to the library for a discussion during the other rabbi's sermon. Following this, everyone will return to the sanctuary to conclude the service.

NEW THIS YEAR FOR YOUNG CHILDREN!

On Friday, September 10 at 4 PM Rabbis Barr and Baum will host a Family Rosh Hashanah Celebration! This program is geared for 0 to 6 year olds and their families. Join us for a very abbreviated and kid-friendly

service, singing, stories, an activity, and a delicious snack of apples and honey. Members and non-members are encouraged to attend!

SEATING ARRANGEMENTS

All are welcome to Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services. We ask only that members and guests consider each other and recognize there is an eventual limit to our seating space.

This year, Beth Adam and OurJewishCommunity.org will again offer an online memorial service. The brief service will go online on Yom Kippur afternoon (September 18) and will be available for viewing after that date as well.

Like the Beth Adam Yom Kippur Memorial service, there will be an opportunity for you to remember your loved ones in the online memorial service. While at Beth Adam we read the names of deceased relatives, the online service will allow us to feature names and photographs in a slide show. The online service will also include readings from Beth Adam's liturgy, read by Rabbis Barr and Baum.
